This initiative is run by the Children's Book Project, which has delivered hundreds of books for Godwin children to enjoy. Over the next couple of weeks every child will get to choose a book from the Book Hut to keep for themselves. They can also borrow other books while they read them this term and then swap them for others when they have finished. What an amazing way to encourage children to love reading!


Head Teacher's Message Continued.....
